## **Top 17 Classroom Management Strategies that should be emphasized in every classroom**

<b>Strategy</b>	<b>Description</b>
<b>1. Increase ratio of positive to negative teacher to student interactions</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• <b>At least 4 to 1</b></li> <li>• <b>Positive interaction every 5 minutes</b></li> <li>• <b>Follow correction for rule violation with positive reinforcer for rule following</b></li> </ul>
<b>2. Actively Supervise at all times</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• <b>Move continuously</b></li> <li>• <b>Scan continuously &amp; overtly</b></li> <li>• <b>Interact frequently &amp; positively</b></li> <li>• <b>Positively reinforce rule following behaviors</b></li> </ul>
<b>3. Positively interact with most students during lesson</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• <b>Physical, verbal, visual contact</b></li> <li>• <b>Group v. individual</b></li> <li>• <b>Instructional &amp; social</b></li> </ul>
<b>4. Manage minor (low intensity/frequency) problem behaviors positively &amp; quickly</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• <b>Signal occurrence</b></li> <li>• <b>State correct response</b></li> <li>• <b>Ask student to restate/show</b></li> <li>• <b>Disengage quickly &amp; early</b></li> </ul>
<b>5. Follow school procedures for chronic problem behaviors</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• <b>Be consistent &amp; business-like</b></li> <li>• <b>Precorrect for next occurrence</b></li> </ul>
<b>6. Conduct smooth &amp; efficient transitions between activities</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• <b>Taught routine</b></li> <li>• <b>Engage students immediately</b></li> </ul>

<b>Strategy</b>	<b>Description</b>
7. Be prepared for activity	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Prepare filler activities</li> <li>• Know desired outcome</li> <li>• Have materials</li> <li>• Practice presentation fluency</li> </ul>
8. Begin with clear explanations of outcomes/objective	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Advance organizer</li> <li>• Point of reference</li> </ul>
9. Allocate most time to instruction	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Fill day with instructional activities</li> <li>• Maximize teacher led engagement</li> </ul>
10. Engage students in active responding	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Write</li> <li>• Verbalize</li> <li>• Participate</li> </ul>
11. Give each student multiple ways to actively respond	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Individual v. choral responses</li> <li>• Written v. gestures</li> <li>• Peer-based</li> </ul>
12. Regularly check for student understanding	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Questions</li> <li>• Affirmative gestures</li> <li>• Written action</li> </ul>
13. End Activity with specific feedback	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Academic v. social</li> <li>• Individual v. group</li> </ul>
14. Provide specific information about what happens next	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Homework</li> <li>• New activity</li> <li>• Next meeting</li> </ul>
15. Know how many students met the objective/outcomes	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Oral</li> <li>• Written</li> <li>• Sample</li> </ul>
16. Provide extra time/assistance for unsuccessful students	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• More practice</li> <li>• More instruction</li> </ul>
17. Plan for next time activity conducted	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Firm up outcome</li> <li>• New outcome</li> <li>• Test</li> </ul>

*Effective Teaching Strategies*

- There are high rates of engaged time
- There are high rates of student success
- Teacher maintains student attention
- There are smooth and effective transitions
  - \* teach rules about transition
  - \* pre-corrects & advanced organizers
- Clear group rules
  - \* stated positively
  - \* stated succinctly
  - \* stated in observable terms
  - \* made public
  - \* enforced
  - \* small number
  - \* taught
- Positive climate
  - \* communicate expectations for achievement
  - \* safe, orderly, and focused environment for work
  - \* smooth group prevention management strategies
- Rapid pacing
- Frequent questioning
- Appropriate feedback given to students
  - \* always provide immediate feedback in the acquisition phase
  - \* always provide precise feedback
  - \* combine feedback with instruction
- There are high expectations for student learning
- Incentives and rewards are used to promote excellence
- Personal interactions between teachers and students are positive

**Instruction**

- Advanced organizers given
- Specific explanations and clear instructions given
- Lesson well paced
- Student attention maintained throughout lesson
- Opportunity for student practice
- Frequent and detailed positive feedback given to students
- Appropriate error correction and review strategies employed

**Classroom Management**

- Precorrects given
- Active positive interactions with students
- Positive feedback given to students
- Smooth transitions between lessons/activities
- Differential reinforcement used appropriately
- Non Instructional time is kept to a minimum
- Positive, predictable, orderly learning environment maintained
- Classroom rules posted and enforced consistently and equitably
- Individual behavior change strategies implemented appropriately

## ENVIRONMENTAL INVENTORY

Rate each feature using the following scale:

<b>Physical Space:</b> Is physical space organized to allow access to instructional materials?	
• Work centers are easily identified and corresponds with instruction	1 2 3 4 5
• Traffic flow minimizes physical contact between peers and maximizes teacher 's mobility	1 2 3 4 5
<b>Attention:</b> Does the teacher gain the attention of the students prior to instruction?	
• A consistent and clear attention signal is used across instructional contexts	1 2 3 4 5
• Uses a variety of techniques to gain, maintain, and regain student attention to task.	1 2 3 4 5
<b>Time:</b> Does the teacher initiate instructional cues and materials to gain, maintain, and regain student attention?

• Common intrusions are anticipated and handled with a consistent procedure. Unexpected intrusions are minimized with an emphasis on returning to instruction.	1 2 3 4 5

<b>Behavior Management:</b> Does the teacher have universal systems of PBS in place?

<b>Routines:</b> Does the teacher have procedures and routines that are clear and consistently followed?

<b>Curriculum and Content: Does the teacher implement effective instruction strategies?</b>
